RULES FOR EXHIBITORS

1. All exhibits must be the bona-fide property of the competitor at least **three months** previous to the show.
2. No exhibit may be entered in more than one class.
3. To make the exhibition interesting, and creditable to the Society, all exhibits should be neatly arranged and, where possible, correctly named.
4. The decision of the Judges shall be final in all cases.
5. The Judges may withhold or modify placings where exhibits are considered of insufficient merit and may, if they think fit, make additional awards, although these may not be specified in the schedule.
6. The Executive reserves the right to re-classify any exhibit wrongly entered, and to withhold prizes where there is insufficient competition.
7. The Society is not responsible for damage done to or loss of exhibits during or after exhibition, but will take all ordinary care for their safety.
8. All flowers must be shown on their own stems.
9. A NOVICE, is a first, or, second year exhibitor.
11. An INTERMEDIATE, is an exhibitor, who has exhibited for between 3 and 6 years.
12. An OPEN exhibitor, has exhibited for more than 6 years.
13. If exhibitors wish they may "Show Up". Thus, an Intermediate can show in the Open class, or a Novice in the Intermediate class. But, no exhibitor may exhibit across several classes, i.e. in both Novice and Intermediate, at the same show. Once an exhibitor "Shows Up" they shall remain in their new class, except at the discretion of the Show Secretary.
14. **All exhibits must be staged by 10:15 and the hall cleared for judging.**
15. Only society vases to be used, each entry to be staged in one vase unless otherwise stated.
17. Points for Points Prizes are as follows: first, 5 points; second 3 points; third, 1 point. In the event of a tie, awards for first take precedence over second, similarly second over third.
18. No exhibit shall be removed before 3:00pm Sunday.
19. No entry fee. Entries open to the public.
20. The hall is normally open for staging on the Friday preceding the show from 2pm till 9pm.

Dahlia Classification

Dahlias range in size from tiny micro dahlias with flowers less than 50mm to giants with a diameter of over 250mm. Dahlias are classified according to their flower type and size.

- Giant flowered cultivars have blooms with a diameter of over 250mm.
- Large flowered cultivars have blooms with a diameter between 200mm-250mm.
- Medium flowered cultivars have blooms with a diameter between 155mm-200mm.
- Small flowered cultivars have blooms with a diameter between 115mm-155mm.
- Miniature flowered cultivars have blooms with a diameter not exceeding 115mm.
- Large Pompom flowered cultivars have blooms with a diameter between 51mm and 80mm
- Pompone flowered cultivars have blooms with a diameter less than 50mm.
- Micro flowered cultivars have blooms whose diameter does not exceed 60mm.
- COLLARETTE, PEONY, ANEMONE and SINGLES, under 155mm
- GIANT, LARGE and MEDIUM CACTUS, over 155mm
- LARGE FIMBRIATED, over 155mm
- SMALL FIMBRIATED, under 155mm



Anemone

Anemone centred Dahlia have a single row of petals with a central cushion of petals. In good quality blooms the cushion is even and flat.



Semi Cactus/Cactus

Cactus dahlia have double blooms showing no central disc. Florets, narrow, pointed and fully revolute for more than half their length, straight, or incurving so tips point towards the front of the bloom. **Semi-cactus dahlia** have fully double blooms showing no central disc. Florets, broad at their base and pointed at the tips. Centre shall be full and undeveloped florets immediately round the centre may be flat. Fully developed florets should be revolute for more than one quarter of their length, but not more than half their length.



Ball

Ball dahlias have fully double blooms showing no central disc. The blooms are spherical or slightly flattened on the face. The florets are blunt or rounded at their tips and are involute for more than half their length.



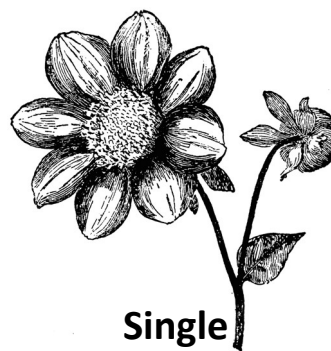
Fimbriated

Fimbriated dahlias have fully double blooms showing no central disc. The florets are forked or split into two or more points – the splits should ideally show no barbing. Fimbriation is found within most classification groups of the dahlia.



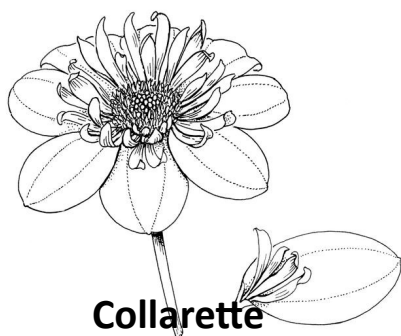
Decorative

Decorative dahlias have fully double blooms showing no central disc. The florets are broad and are essentially flat, being neither markedly involute or revolute. In some cultivars the florets may be recurved, while in others (informal), they may be slightly twisted.



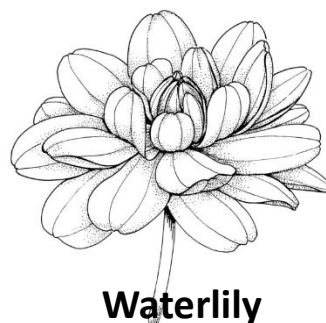
Single

Single dahlias have blooms with a single outer ring of ray florets, which may overlap, surrounding a circular central disc of tubular disc florets



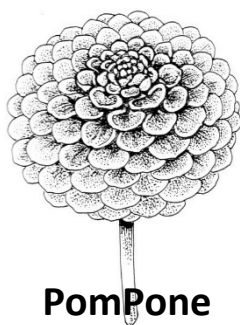
Collarette

Collarette dahlias have blooms with a single outer ring of ray florets, surrounding a circular central disc of tubular disc florets. The outer parts of the ray florets are usually flat and may overlap. The inner parts are modified and form a collar of petaloids. This collar does not normally exceed half the length of the outer parts and is often, though not necessarily, of contrasting colour.



Waterlily

Waterlily Dahlias have fully double blooms showing no central disc. The blooms are shallow and saucer shaped, the depth being less than half the diameter. Florets are incurving and their ends may be rounded or pointed and ideally should have between five and seven rows of florets fully open for exhibition.



PomPone

Pompone dahlias have fully double blooms showing no central disc. The blooms are spherical, with full, even centres. The florets are rounded at their tips and are involute for the whole of their length. The blooms are born directly on top of their stems.

DEFINITIONS

Exhibition: Between half and three quarters open, of good sizes with ample petals symmetrically arranged within a circular outline around a well formed centre; judged in the order of form, freshness, balance and foliage.

Decorative: Between one quarter and one half open with gracefully arranged well formed petals producing a bloom of more slender proportions than Exhibition Blooms: judged in the order of freshness, form, balance and foliage.

Stem of Roses: Stems should have gracefully arranged heads comprising a flower/flowers and side bud/s, judged in order of freshness, form (flower bud and spacing), balance and foliage. The type of flower is not taken into consideration.

Champion Rose to be selected from the following Premiers Exhibition, Decorative, Fully Open, and Stem from Classes 200 to 234.

Garden Roses: Non-Rose Society members only. Flowers only to be judged.

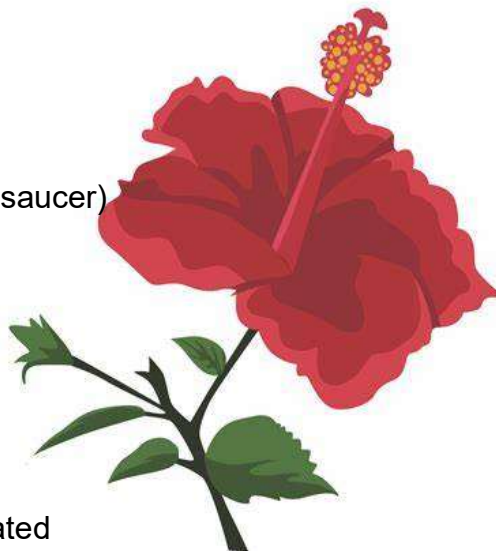
